In recognition of Black History month, all piano selections in February are arrangements of traditional spirituals. Spirituals have their genesis in the oral tradition of African people enslaved on American plantations. Exposed to Christianity by their masters, slaves drew deep connections between Jesus' suffering and their own. They expressed and passed down their new faith using improvised melodies to retell Bible stories, give voice to the profound suffering and oppression they endured, and encourage one another with the promise of one day crossing "over Jordan... where all is peace." Spirituals were also used as a means of communicating covert messages about the Underground Railroad, as well as bolstering the spirits of those protesting during the Civil Rights Era. We celebrate this musical art form—one of the oldest and uniquely American—and those both known and unknown who created it.
